## Message from Leadership

Dear friends,

This year has felt like a two-part story, full of highs and lows. Through it all, your support has kept our mission alive: welcoming refugees and immigrants to North Carolina.

Between July and December 2024, CWS offices in Burlington, Durham, Greensboro, and Wilmington worked with the U.S. State Department and partners across the country to rebuild the refugee resettlement program. Because of these efforts, the United States welcomed 100,000 refugees between October 2023 and September 2024. Many were family members of people already here, Afghan allies, and others who had waited for decades for their chance to arrive. In November and December alone, our staff and volunteers welcomed almost 400 refugees to North Carolina, working day and night, knowing that the door might soon close.

Then everything changed in January. In our collective 26 years with CWS, we have never seen such strong actions taken against refugees, the non-profits that serve them, and the communities that welcome them. Federal funding was frozen. The United States Refugee Admissions Program was stopped. Contracts were canceled. In early February, these polices together created a cash flow crisis that forced us to furlough two-thirds of our team. [Because government funding works on a reimbursement model, CWS and other non-profits front a lot of money to administer those programs, with the assumption that we'll be reimbursed in a timely manner. It wasn't until May that we received funds for work we had done as far back as December.]

Your quick and generous gifts to the Durham emergency appeal made sure families stayed fed, housed, and able to work. You helped us keep going.

The cash flow crisis has passed, but big changes remain that impact funding and the larger social service sector. Refugees who once qualified for food stamps are no longer eligible—with a loss of Medicaid to follow. Funding for legal help has been cut. And increased immigration enforcement activities in the Triangle have created real fear across immigrant communities. For the first time, refugees are calling our office and asking, "Is it safe to leave my house?"

These months have been heavy. But we are inspired—by the courage of immigrants and by the kindness of neighbors like you. Your everyday acts of endurance, advocacy, hospitality, and generosity hold fast to a shared vision: a world where every person has food, a voice, and a safe place to call home.


